The ABC – Art for Building Community microlearning courses focus on using the transformative force of creativity for community regeneration to respond to the contemporary societal challenges, such as the severe impact that the COVID-19 pandemic has had on artists, the cultural sector, on social inclusion and cohesion. The learning content is designed primarily for nonprofessional artists, community leaders and art educators to become successful innovators in their communities.

The aim of the 4 courses is to equip learners to develop ideas, projects and businesses aimed towards encouraging social inclusion by fostering innovative, arts-based participatory and intercultural dialogue approaches.

In Microlearning Course 1, "Understanding the community and Co-design", the course looks into what a community is, explores different examples of communities and how a learner can empower community people. The course delves into the definition and levels of co-design, explores community engagement strategies, examines the various tools used in co-design, addresses the challenges and benefits of co-design, and highlights the role of new technologies in the process.

In the 2nd microlearning course "**Networking and Partnership Building**" dives into how to establish relations where there are none, recreate broken ones, and build partnerships that are based on equality, equity and solidarity. This course addresses the challenges associated with building inclusive social networks; the learners are informed about the reach and potential of the variety of your roles, as well as how to use them to be most successful in innovating one community. Offered case studies showcase the taste of challenges that might

await you as well as some of the practical tools to use.

In the 3th microlearning course "Budgeting and Fundraising" the learners gain knowledge about some basic concepts and tools to manage the economic and financial side of a project and how to create a budget from scratch. The trainers explains how to develop a suitable strategy to find funds to realise a project and open up the world of "donors". Learners learn more about different types of donations and how to get in touch with them. Through examples and cases studies practical tools are shared.

The fourth course "Entrepreneurship and Career Building" explores the possibilities the learners might consider for identifying your career path as an artist/creative. The course guides the learners towards better understanding of how to turn an idea into a creative enterprise that can bring added value to your community as well as the basics of entrepreneurship with a strong focus on social and arts entrepreneurship. The course offers the knowledge to learn how to identify and evaluate a business idea, how to do market research and create and use the business model canvas, understand what marketing, brand and branding are, how to fund and sustain your business whilst having a social impact.

Part I

How to engage, connect and co-design with and for communities through art and creativity

and share their unique stories and emotions. Empowering communities also requires longterm, systematic community engagement that fosters dialogue, builds trust, and creates participatory spaces. It is essential to approach community empowerment with a sense of mutual respect, commonality, and the recognition that everyone has something valuable to contribute. By working together to decrease social exclusion and marginalization, we can forge strong bonds and create a more inclusive and empowered society.

Engaging, connecting, and co-designing with communities through art and creativity is a multi-faceted process that requires careful consideration and strategic approaches. Here are some key steps to effectively engage, connect, and co-design with communities:

1) Nurturing community empowerment through art and creativity is paramount in fostering meaningful community engagement. The essence of empowerment lies in enabling individuals and communities to seize control of their artistic journeys and creative expressions. Offer platforms and initiatives that invite active participation from community members, ensuring their voices are not only heard but also cherished and respected. Cultivate spaces that facilitate open dialogue, collaborative endeavors, and a sense of collective ownership, empowering communities to shape and define their artistic narratives.

2) Understand the community: Take the time to deeply understand the community you wish to engage with. Building trust within the community is essential for meaningful engagement and co-design.

7) Promote social and political change: Engaging with communities through art and creativity should have a broader purpose of contributing to social and political change. Encourage artists and community members to address relevant social issues, raise awareness, challenge stereotypes, and promote inclusivity. Art can be a powerful tool for initiating conversations, fostering empathy, and driving positive transformations within communities.

By following these steps and adopting an inclusive and empowering approach, you can effectively engage, connect, and co-design with communities through art and creativity.





Remember to continually adapt and refine your strategies based on the unique needs and dynamics of each community, nurturing a sustainable and impactful engagement process.



What is co-design¹

Co-design defies a singular definition as its nature encompasses various interpretations. However, at its core, co-design is recognized as a political act that empowers individuals to exert influence and take charge of their environment (Sherry R. Arnstein, 2007). By engaging in co-design processes, citizens gain the ability to actively shape and participate in decisionmaking regarding matters that impact their lives and communities. This empowerment

forms the essence of co-design, highlighting its transformative power in granting citizens the agency to create meaningful change.

Originating in the 1970s, co-design emerged as a form of cooperative design, involving the direct participation of workers in improving their working conditions and shaping the products they use. The essence of co-design lies in expanding citizen participation, fostering dialogue, respect, and trust within the community. It is a process that activates and mobilizes community members, enabling them to play an active role in decision-making. Co-design is a continuous learning process that brings together diverse stakeholders to reach common goals. It empowers vulnerable groups, promotes bottom-up decision-making, and is exemplified by projects such as the "She's Gone" exhibition.

The "She's Gone" exhibition serves as a poignant example within the context of co-design. This art installation is specifically designed to raise public awareness about the global issue of gender-based murders committed by spouses and family members. It symbolizes a collaborative effort involving families affected by this tragedy, artists, organizations, and relevant stakeholders. By creating this project, they aim to shine a light on this pressing issue and mobilize the community for social change. The exhibition not only exemplifies the principles of co-design but also showcases the power of art and creativity as vehicles for addressing and challenging societal injustices. Through the collective efforts of diverse stakeholders, the "She's Gone" exhibition contributes to empowering the community, fostering dialogue, and inspiring action to combat gender-based violence.

Benefits and Difficulties of Co-Design

The benefits of collaborative design are numerous and impactful. Firstly, it allows for the inclusion of groups and individuals who may not typically have a voice in negotiations and dialogue, promoting diversity and representation. Additionally, collaborative design enables different stakeholders to take on greater responsibility throughout the project development process, fostering increased motivation and commitment from all participants. The opportunity for extensive discussion and reflection among various stakeholders also arises, leading to richer insights and perspectives. Collaborative design facilitates the establishment of stronger links and networks, improving information sharing capabilities. Moreover, it promotes a dynamic course design process, as new connections and lines of communication are formed, ultimately resulting in higher satisfaction with training programs.

However, collaborative design also poses certain challenges. The sheer size and complexity of involving a large number of stakeholders and design actors can make coordination and management tedious. Collaboration necessitates transparency and extensive communication, which can require significant effort and resources. Social complexities arise due to the diverse personal characteristics of stakeholders and their relationships, including cultural differences and varying levels of knowledge. These factors can hinder effective collaboration. Furthermore, managing collaborative design projects demands specific skills that may not be readily available, as actors may lack prior experience in embracing collaboration and open-mindedness.







Exploring Co-Design Approaches and Innovative Activities

Introduction:

Approaching co-design becomes essential when projects grow increasingly complex, requiring effective and cross-functional solutions. Collaborative design enables diverse perspectives to come together, as individual efforts alone are insufficient to address multifaceted issues. However, managing collaborative design processes poses challenges due to the involvement of numerous stakeholders and organizations with varying competencies. To develop successful co-design practices, key questions must be addressed, such as the meaning of participation in decision-making, identifying relevant participants, providing necessary support, and determining suitable methodologies and tools for the design process. This chapter delves into co-design planning, outlines a sequence of events in co-design, and presents specific innovative activities and techniques for engaging, connecting, and co-designing with communities.

Co-Design Planning:

Co-design planning involves multiple individuals, groups, and communities, each with distinct ideas and goals. This planning process follows a non-linear approach, characterized by cycles of planning, action, observation, reflection, and re-planning. It forms a continuous, cyclical chain wherein each cycle informs the subsequent one, necessitating constant movement between different stages. Designers must be adaptable and willing to navigate these stages to ensure a comprehensive co-design process. Various tools and approaches can support co-design planning, empowering teams to facilitate collaboration effectively. The choice of tools depends on specific factors and contexts, making the toolbox inexhaustible.

Sequence of Events in Co-Design:

The co-design process can be broadly categorized into three stages: initiation, preparation, and realization. During the initiation phase, the groundwork for a collaborative process is







laid, including gathering information, spreading awareness among stakeholders, clarifying process premises, and strategizing. The preparation stage involves making critical decisions regarding content and organization, defining aims and assignments, inviting relevant stakeholders, establishing decision-making frameworks, determining financial aspects and timescales, and addressing logistical considerations. The realization stage focuses on roles and powers clarification, establishing rules for democratic agreements, ensuring smooth information flow among participants and the public, and implementing and presenting the jointly achieved results.

Specific Innovatory Approaches:

To successfully engage, connect, and co-design with communities, a range of innovative approaches can be employed. Activities inspired by those approaches promote creative thinking, constructive dialogue, problem-solving, and community empowerment. Here are some notable examples:

Brainstorming:

Participants generate ideas, opinions, and solutions through associative thinking, fostering creativity and consensus-building.

Concept maps (Mind Maps):

Visual diagrams illustrating ideas with different colors and font sizes, facilitating the exploration and synthesis of concepts.

World Café:

A creative process that encourages dynamic dialogue and the exchange of knowledge and ideas among participants, fostering a lively network of discussion and action.







Think & Listen:

A role-playing method used in the early stages to build trust and partnerships, where participants take turns as speakers and listeners to gather and distill valuable viewpoints.

Conflict Resolution:

A technique for addressing conflicts by identifying their core sources, facilitating group discussions and negotiations to achieve consensus.

Open Theater (Forum Theater):

A participatory form of theater that encourages interaction and explores solutions to problematic situations through collective brainstorming and role-play.

Art Interventions:

Art Interventions involve the use of creative mediums, such as Creative Placemaking and community-based exhibitions, to address community challenges. Creative Placemaking refers to the process of transforming public spaces through artistic and cultural activities to enhance the social, cultural, and economic well-being of a community. It involves engaging artists, community members, and stakeholders to create vibrant and meaningful spaces that reflect the identity and aspirations of the community. Through community-based exhibitions and artistic initiatives, awareness is raised, cooperation is promoted, and innovative solutions to local challenges are inspired. These art interventions aim to bring people together, spark dialogue, and foster positive change within the community.

Creative Hackathons:

Collaborative events that bring together individuals from diverse backgrounds to address specific community challenges, leveraging creativity to devise impactful solutions.

Community Mapping:







Engaging citizens in identifying common issues, recording needs and resources, and facilitating community participation in problem-solving.

Scenario Analysis:

An interactive method involving a group in creating and exploring possible future scenarios to identify feasible options and develop implementation strategies.

Video Documentaries:

Creating awareness of societal and environmental challenges by showcasing inspiring personal or community choices and activities that contribute to community development.

Community Workshops:

Empowering participants to address social and environmental challenges through workshops tailored to specific topics, such as promoting senior creativity or supporting artists affected by substance use.

Zines:

Low-cost, self-produced magazines that serve as platforms for collective identification of innovative solutions and enable discussion and collaboration during workshops.

Artistic Collaborations:

Foster collaborations between artists, community members, and stakeholders to create artistic projects that address community challenges, stimulate dialogue, and inspire innovative solutions.

Participatory Photography:







Engage community members in capturing photographs that reflect their experiences, perspectives, and aspirations. These visual narratives can serve as powerful tools for storytelling, community engagement, and co-design processes.

Creative Workshops and Maker Spaces:

Organize workshops and provide maker spaces where community members can explore their creativity, experiment with different materials and technologies, and collaboratively design solutions to local challenges.

Public Art Installations:

Facilitate the creation of public art installations that involve community members in the artistic process. These installations can serve as focal points for community engagement, reflection, and collective visioning.

Creative Residencies:

Invite artists to reside in a community and work closely with local residents to co-design creative projects that address community needs, celebrate local culture, and promote social cohesion.

Digital Storytelling:

Empower community members to express their stories and perspectives through digital media, combining multimedia elements such as audio, video, and images. These digital stories can amplify diverse voices and foster community connections.

Conclusion:

These co-design formats not only encourage community engagement and collaboration but also leverage the power of creativity and artistic expression to generate innovative

Examples of Good Practices in Social Innovation and Artistic Community Interventions Organised or Supported by Art Is Us Project Partners

Project: A Community Collaborative Exhibition - New Life

Organization: APIS Institute (Slovenia) Categories: Community Intervention, Artistic Collaborations, Digital Storytelling, Exhibition for Social Change

Summary:

In the project "New Life" organized by APIS Institute, a community collaborative exhibition was created to provide a platform for Ukrainian artists who sought refuge in Slovenia after the February attack on Ukraine. The exhibition aimed to explore the concept of "New Life" through their artworks, reflecting on their experiences and hopes amidst significant life changes. The exhibition was a collaborative response to the Ukrainian community's request for support in co-designing an artistic event that could authentically represent their views, perceptions, and feelings.

The coordinated exhibition, held in December on the International Day of Human Rights, showcased the artistic expressions and interpretations of these artists. Through their artworks, they shared their stories, emotions, and visions, engaging in a dialogue with the community and giving voice to their experiences of living in Slovenia.






The project served as a space for reflection, connection, and cultural understanding, encouraging the exchange of ideas and perspectives in between newcomers and the local community.

The exhibition not only provided an opportunity for the Ukrainian artists to showcase their talents but also highlighted the significance of promoting human rights, cultural diversity, and the power of art in addressing social issues. By centering the exhibition around the International Day of Human Rights and International Migrants Day, it emphasized the resilience, hope, and universal pursuit of a better future.

Analyses

The project "New Life" by APIS Institute is highly relevant in terms of community co-design, creativity, and the empowerment of vulnerable artists and communities.

Community Co-design: The project exemplifies community co-design by actively involving the Ukrainian artists in shaping the exhibition. The artists co-designed the project, bringing forth their unique perspectives, experiences, and visions. Through their collaboration with the community, they engaged in a dialogue, shared their stories, and contributed to shaping the narrative of the exhibition. The project fostered a space for reflection, connection, and cultural understanding, emphasizing the importance of community engagement and participation in the artistic process.

Creativity: The project highlights the power of creativity as a means of expression and communication, and also as a medium of social inclusion and integration into new environments. The artworks created by the Ukrainian artists showcase their artistic talents and provide a platform for them to express their interpretations of life and the concept of "New Life." Through various artistic mediums, the artists explored their emotions, hopes, and challenges, demonstrating the transformative and expressive potential of creativity, but also expressed their challenges they have been facing in the new localities.

Empowerment of Community/Communities: The project empowers both the vulnerable Ukrainian artists and the broader community. For the artists, it provides a platform to share their experiences and talents, giving them a voice and visibility within their new community in Slovenia. By engaging in the artistic process and co-designing the exhibition, the artists gain a sense of ownership and empowerment over their narratives. For the broader

The Role of Diversity and Interculturalism: The music group, comprised of Basma, Orwa, and Atanasovski, embodies the essence of diversity and interculturalism. Not only does the trio represent a harmonious collaboration between musicians from different backgrounds, but it also reflects the historical migration from North Macedonia to Slovenia. Atanasovski, a second-generation migrant and accomplished musician, has significantly contributed to Slovenia's music scene, advocating for diversity through his work. The inclusion of Syrian







musicians within this trio further reinforces the efforts to promote diversity and foster intercultural understanding.

Supporting the Community of Refugees and Migrants: The concert provided a platform for artists who were refugees and migrants themselves, such as Basma and Orwa, to showcase their talents and contribute to the cultural fabric of the community. By highlighting their artistic abilities and sharing their unique stories, the project empowered these artists and helped break down stereotypes and biases often associated with refugees and migrants. This enlightening conversation further enriched the overall experience, providing insightful perspectives on the subject matter.



She initiated the Uartist community with the aim of supporting Ukrainian artists both in the diaspora and within Ukraine. This artistic community primarily consists of painters, but also includes illustrators, photographers, and sculptors. Utilizing online platforms such as Youtube, Instagram, Telegram and Zoom, the community serves as a knowledge library, safe community support online group, and virtual meet-up space. Within the community, Anna offers valuable insights and practical knowledge regarding career development and the art business, particularly in relation to the challenges posed by the war. She also extends emotional support to fellow artists who experience stress and turmoil due to the conflict. By sharing her expertise and creating a nurturing space for artistic growth, Anna actively engages







in co-designing with the community, empowering artists to navigate the art market, adapt to new environments, and find solace in shared experiences.

Analyses:

Uartis community building project Anna initiated demonstrates several approaches used in co-designing with communities:

1. Empowering Knowledge Sharing: Anna leverages her expertise as an artist and art educator to share practical insights and hands-on knowledge with community members. By offering guidance on navigating the art market, particularly in the challenging times of the war, she equips artists with valuable information to support their careers and adapt to new circumstances.

2. Online Community Building: Through the use of online platforms, Anna creates a virtual space for Ukrainian artists to connect, collaborate, and share experiences. This approach overcomes geographical limitations, allowing artists from different locations to come together and form a supportive community.

3. Emotional Support and Well-being: Recognizing the emotional toll of the conflict on artists, Anna provides a safe and understanding environment where artists can seek emotional support and share their struggles. This approach acknowledges the importance of nurturing well-being and resilience within the community.

4. Inclusivity and Support: Anna's initiative extends support to a diverse range of artists, including those who decided to stay in Ukraine and those who became refugees in European countries. By embracing inclusivity, the community becomes a platform where artists from different backgrounds can find support, share their stories, and build connections.

5. Personal Engagement and Advocacy: Anna's personal connection to Ukraine and her emotional involvement in the conflict drive her determination to support fellow artists. Project: Urban Art Ventures Project

Summary:

Urban Art Ventures project seeks to reactivate and revitalise urban spaces of Thessaloniki through street art and cultural activities and give to the local people and the international participants, a chance to explore the possibilities of engagement in the cultural life and the development urban landscape of Thessaloniki.

35 urban artists and street performers as well as urban art educators from Serbia, Bulgaria, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Netherlands, Poland, Spain and the United Kingdom were gathered in Thessaloniki, Greece from 20 to 29 September 2015 to share their experiences, best practices and knowledge regarding the use of urban art as a medium to promote active participation, understanding, respect for the other as well as for public spaces

and to contribute to the urban art of Thessaloniki by creating their urban artworks in collaboration with local urban artists from 22 to 27 September.

Their diverse background secured different aspects on the topics of project and fosters a multifaceted solution process.

Analyses

The gathering of 35 urban artists, street performers, and urban art educators from various countries in Thessaloniki, Greece, for the purpose of sharing experiences and knowledge regarding the use of urban art, is highly relevant in terms of community co-design, creativity, and the empowerment of both the artists and the local community. Here's how it relates to these aspects:

Community Co-design: By bringing together artists from different countries and backgrounds, the project created a space for collaboration and exchange of ideas. The artists had the opportunity to work with local urban artists, fostering a co-design process







where diverse perspectives and approaches were incorporated into the creation of urban artworks. This collaboration allowed for the integration of local knowledge, experiences, and community input, ensuring that the artworks resonated with and represented the local context.

Creativity: Urban art is inherently creative, and the project provided a platform for artists to express their creativity in public spaces. Project: Virtual Art Residency - Connecting Ukrainian Artists with the Global Community

Organization: Collaboration between Uartist & APIS Institute (Slovenia) Categories: Artist Collaboration, Cross-Cultural Communication, Virtual Gallery, Virtual Collaboration, Cultural Preservation

Summary:

The virtual art residency program was hosted by APIS Institute and coordinated by an initiator of the artist community, an Ukrainian artist living in Slovenia, Anna Miklashevich. It provided a virtual platform for five Ukrainian artists who continue to create in Ukraine despite facing extreme circumstances. The program served as a form of support for these artists, granting them a voice and an opportunity to express themselves. The outcomes of the art residency were presented in a virtual gallery and showcased in the Art is Us Exhibition held in Ljubljana. The chosen theme for the residency, as described by the participating artists themselves, was "RE:CONNECTION." This project aimed to revive the cultural heritage of their ancestors and foster communication with peoples around the world through the unique language of painting.

The artists sought to rebuild bridges with Slavic nations in Europe that had been severed during the Soviet Union era. The initial step in this process was the revival of the Ukrainian language and the incorporation of ornamental motifs as a cultural code representing their nation. "RE:CONNECTION" symbolized the rebirth and reinterpretation of their heritage within the context of contemporary circumstances, while emphasizing the intrinsic value of their cultural identity.

It is worth noting that the group of artists involved in this project showcased exemplary unity and solidarity. Although they were born in different parts of Ukraine, including Kyiv, Crimea,





Kharkiv, and Mykolaiv, they united under a common vision and purpose. 5. Revitalization of Heritage: The artists aimed to revive and reinterpret their cultural heritage in contemporary circumstances. By incorporating the Ukrainian language and ornamental motifs, they aimed to restore the cultural code of their nation and reaffirm its value.

Project: World Café

Organization: Melting Pro and Numero Cromatico (Italy) Categories: Participatory Mapping, Arts-Based Activism, Creative Workshops and Maker Spaces





Summary

The World Café event, organized by Melting Pro in collaboration with the art collective Numero Cromatico, was part of the Abc- Art for Building Community initiative, a free online training course promoted by the European project Art is Us - Art for local innovators. The event aimed to foster art, cultural participation, and community engagement. Participants were actively encouraged to share their perspectives on daily life in the urban and cultural context. In the second part of the event, Numero Cromatico shared their experiences and projects with the community. They then led a group of citizens on an Urban Route in Visual Deprivation, an unconventional exploration of Rome's Tor Pignattara neighborhood. Guided by the artists, participants experienced the neighborhood blindfolded, exploring the urban environment without relying on sight. This sensory-deprived experience heightened their perception of reality, allowing other senses like sound, touch, and smell to manifest with different intensities. The sensations and perceptions of the participants were collected and processed into video and audio products, capturing their unique journey. Through this creative and co-design approach, the event aimed to deepen community connections and challenge conventional perceptions of the urban environment.

Analyses

The World Café event organized by Melting Pro and Numero Cromatico is relevant in terms of community co-design, creativity, and community empowerment because of these aspects specifically:

Community Co-Design: The event provides a platform for community members to actively participate in shaping the discussion and sharing their perspectives. By creating a space for dialogue and exchange, participants are encouraged to contribute their ideas, insights, and experiences related to daily life in the urban and cultural context. This co-design approach ensures that community voices are heard and that their input informs the direction of the event.

Creativity: The event fosters creativity by incorporating artistic and sensory experiences into the exploration of the urban environment. Through the Urban Route in Visual Deprivation, participants engage in a unique and unconventional exploration of Rome's Tor Pignattara neighborhood. By experiencing the environment without relying on sight, participants are encouraged to tap into their other senses and perceive the urban landscape in new and creative ways. This stimulates their imagination, enhances their sensory awareness, and promotes a deeper connection with the surroundings.

Community Empowerment: The event empowers the community by providing a platform for cultural participation and engagement. Participants are actively involved in sharing their perspectives, experiences, and stories, allowing them to have a voice and contribute to the collective narrative. Through the Urban Route in Visual Deprivation, participants are encouraged to challenge conventional perceptions of the urban environment and explore alternative ways of experiencing and understanding their surroundings. By providing a platform for dialogue, encouraging artistic exploration, and offering unique sensory experiences, the event fosters community connections, challenges perceptions, and promotes active engagement in shaping the urban and cultural landscape.

Project: "You and I – We Are Not So Different" Zine Workshop

Summary:

Within the framework of the European project "You are Welcome" and the Metamorphosis. Human stories project – a cooperation between Armenia, the US and Germany. The zine workshop was held at Hellerau coordinated by the Ass. Prof. Mariana Smith (Stockton University, USA), the German artist, Stephanie Lüning (Hfbk Dresden, Germany) and the Armenian artist, Eva Harut (HfBK, Dresden, GER).

The participants, coming for all over the world, created "Zines". The mini handmade magazines – Zines are easy to create as their based on the collage technique and drawing and can easily. It is a creative way to tell and share a story without necessarily using language but photos, images, illustrations and words. Marianna Smith stressed out the purpose of the Zine: the crafting activity serves the story telling and what does really matter is to share our stories altogether. In a friendly and relaxed atmosphere, the participants sat around the tables full of different kinds of magazines and newspapers and created their own Zines.

Once the first folding was done, the Zines were covered by photos, drawings and writings. At the end of the session, each Zine was opened, scanned and printed and was given to each participant as a memory of their stories and of this nice afternoon. Each participant could present their zines and share with the rest of the group their stories. Some really interesting, and touching Zines were created during this workshop but we especially keep in mind that we shared our stories!

The Zero Waste Nomadic Living Room project by Olga Senatorova Tisler focuses on the use of recycled materials to create a Kazakh living space within Slovenia. With a vision to promote cultural dialogue and exchange knowledge through art, Olga utilizes discarded materials to bring elements of the nomadic lifestyle from Kazakhstan to her new home. Collaborating with mentors Alja Drame and Tomo Perr, the project showcases the transformation of these reclaimed materials into a Kazakh living room, featuring traditional Kazakh and Slovenian patterns. From the Korpeshka pillows made from second-hand materials to the little carpets crafted from old blankets, every aspect of the room exemplifies the possibilities of zero waste design. The table, adorned with laser-cut ornaments filled with thread remnants, symbolizes the connection between people, while the old lamp becomes a striking centerpiece with the addition of an old knitted shawl. The chapan, a traditional Kazakh outerwear, beautifully merges traditions from both countries with a zero waste approach. Through this project, Olga demonstrates the potential of combining sustainability, cultural preservation, and artistic expression.

By merging the traditions of both countries through the chapan, a traditional Kazakh outerwear, Olga successfully showcases the potential of cultural preservation and artistic expression. The project not only creates a visually stunning living space but also serves as a platform for promoting sustainability, cultural dialogue, and community engagement. The incorporation of traditional patterns and cultural elements fosters a sense of belonging and promotes cultural exchange.

The use of recycled materials not only reduces waste but also empowers the community to rethink their consumption habits and embrace sustainable practices.
