#### Introduction

Welcome to "Artful Innovations: A Compendium of Community-Driven Art Projects," the final report of the Art is Us project. This report is a testament to the transformative power of art and creativity in fostering social cohesion and inclusion, particularly within vulnerable and underserved communities.

The Art is Us initiative has been a journey of discovery, learning, and innovation, spanning across four countries - Slovenia, Germany, Italy, Greece and Romania. Our primary goal was to create an innovative online learning environment that encourages and supports creative adults in harnessing the potential of art to uplift their communities. This was achieved

through the development of a <u>Massive Open Online Course (MOOC)</u> complemented by blended learning activities.

We aimed to empower non-professional artists, art educators, community leaders, and creative representatives of underserved communities with new knowledge, mentorship, project development and implementation support. We also facilitated the establishment of an international network of learners interested in these topics and promoted their work through personal stories and exhibitions.

Our approach was community-oriented and grassroots, with a special focus on supporting marginalised, overlooked and underserved communities. Our learners used arts, creativity, and artistic therapeutic methods to address societal concerns or issues through artistic practice that can act as a catalyst to trigger events or changes within a community or at a national or international level. This acted as a catalyst to trigger events or changes within a community and also at a national or international level.

The culmination of the Art is Us project is the implementation of 60 community innovation projects across the four countries, each one a testament to the transformative power of art and creativity. These projects, presented in this report, are the result of the knowledge and skills gained through the MOOC (IO1) and the collaborative environment fostered in IO2. They represent the tangible impact of the Art is Us initiative, showcasing how open innovation activities can create meaningful change in communities.

#### **About**

The learners of the Art is Us MOOC were primarily nonprofessional artists, community leaders, and art educators, and the learning content of the courses aimed to nurture successful community innovators. Below you will find the descriptions of the projects implemented.

#### Anna Miklashevich - UArtist

UArtist is an innovative and heartfelt initiative by Anna Miklashevich, a Ukrainian artist and art educator now living in Slovenia. Amid the distressing backdrop of conflict in her home country, Anna decided to utilize her skills and passion for art to support Ukrainian artists both residing in Ukraine and those forced to become refugees in various European countries. The heart of the project revolves around the creation of an online community named "UARTIST," a platform offering both emotional and career-related support to its members.

Recognizing the new challenges and dynamics introduced by the war, Anna uses the platform to share her hands-on knowledge about the European/international art market and the intricacies of adapting to a new art market. The platform operates on various channels including YouTube, Telegram, and Instagram, fostering a growing and interactive community of artists who not only benefit from Anna's knowledge but also exchange ideas and support amongst themselves.

The project aligns closely with the 'Art is Us' project's ethos, which leverages art for community building and social cohesion. It introduces a novel approach of using art and community interaction as a means of overcoming the challenges imposed by war and displacement, hence making a substantial impact on its members. Anna's initiative serves as a beacon of hope and resilience for artists affected by the Ukrainian conflict, embodying innovation, value creation, impact, sustainability, and scalability in its operations.

Here is analyses of the project "Uartist". It considers the following criteria: Novelty and innovativeness, Value Creation, Impact, Sustainability, and Scalability.

# German Language Course for Beginners created by Magdalena Zapotoczna

The project being analyzed is a German Language Course for Beginners created by Magdalena Zapotoczna. The aim of this project is to provide refugees from Ukraine, who

have sought asylum in Germany due to the ongoing war in their country, with basic German language skills. Additionally, this project aims to foster social integration among the refugees, helping them acclimatize and adapt to their new society. This language course is also a platform for cultural exchange and community building.

Novelty and Innovativeness: The project showcases a high degree of innovativeness. While there may be other language courses, what sets this apart is its tailored approach towards refugees from Ukraine, considering their unique circumstances. Additionally, it goes beyond simply teaching language skills, focusing also on the social integration of refugees into their new community, fostering cultural exchange and understanding.

Value Creation: The project creates substantial social value for its beneficiaries. The knowledge of German language helps refugees improve their chances of employment and integration into the German society. They have agreed to support the organization of the German classes for beginners in the long run and even provided free premises for the course hours.

Scalability: The model of this project can certainly be replicated in other settings. It could serve as a blueprint for other similar initiatives across Europe, where language and social integration classes are needed for the large influx of refugees. In future, this could also be expanded to include more advanced language courses, as well as courses on professional skills and job hunting in the German market.

As part of the association 07b e.V., she has created a space where various forms of art and culture can flourish. This particular project was designed to provide the art work group in the association a dedicated space for sieve printing, enabling creativity and craftsmanship to unfold.

The innovativeness of this project lies in its fresh approach to creating an accessible, inclusive, and affordable artistic space within the community. The sieve printing workroom is a testament to problem-solving and adaptability; it offers a unique solution for low-income individuals who can partake in workshops for a donation. By establishing this workroom, the project introduces a new service and process within the association, empowering members to explore and cultivate their creative skills.

In terms of value creation, the project is an excellent example of creating social and economic benefits. The project serves as a platform for creativity and learning for different target groups, thereby fostering cultural participation, social engagement, active citizenship, and community. It also opens economic opportunities as the skills gained can potentially be monetized.

The potential impact of the project is significant, extending beyond the direct participants. Through its activities, it promotes cultural expression and social inclusivity, nurturing a broader appreciation of art within the community. The impact also transcends into socio-educational domains, aiding in political, social, and philosophical education.

As for sustainability, the project has the potential for long-term viability, especially when considering its alignment with the overall goals of the 07b e.V. association. The project's financial sustainability is strengthened through its model of donation-based workshops and the possibility of funding.

Finally, the project demonstrates strong potential for scalability. The model of a creative workshop can be replicated in other contexts or settings, making it possible to reach and impact a larger audience. The success of this project could inspire similar initiatives, extending the transformative power of art and culture in various communities. The sieve printing workroom is a testament to the transformative force of art and culture, reflecting the larger aims of the Art is Us project.

### **Aleksandra Vagabonda's "Christmas Market for Artists"**

This analysis explores the project "Christmas Market for Artists" led by Aleksandra Vagabonda. Leveraging her involvement in Dresden's artists community, Vagabonda arranged an innovative and inclusive Christmas market where both amateur and professional artists could exhibit and sell their work.

Analyzing the project's "Novelty and Innovativeness", it is evident that the initiative embraced a unique approach to supporting artists and promoting community interaction. The project creatively provided an avenue for artists, especially those struggling financially, to earn from their art. It introduced a new service for artists, particularly those with migrant backgrounds, and offered an innovative solution to the problem of artist visibility and financial struggles.

Regarding "Value Creation", the project generated significant social and economic benefits. Socially, it created a platform for intercultural dialogue and exchange, fostering a sense of community and promoting the visibility of artists, particularly those from marginalized communities. Economically, it provided artists with an opportunity to generate income from their work.

In terms of "Impact", the Christmas Market has the potential to make a significant contribution. It facilitated the exposure of artists, enabling them to reach a wider audience. It brought people together, promoting social cohesion and mutual appreciation of art. The success of the opening event and ongoing engagement indicates the project's significant reach and impact.

The "Sustainability" aspect of the project is demonstrated by its potential for recurrence. As a seasonal event, the Christmas Market can be held annually, continuing to support artists and foster community interaction. Given the positive response, there is potential for

long-term financial sustainability through artist participation fees, donations, or partnerships with local businesses or organizations.

Finally, considering "Scalability", the project can be easily replicated in different communities or contexts. The concept of an art market could be adapted to various settings or themes and could be held at different times throughout the year, encouraging continued community engagement and support for local artists. By creating a space outside of traditional, costly, academic environments, it introduced a unique method of fostering artistic development in young artists. This service was both new and an improved alternative to existing structures.

In the context of "Value Creation," Siegmund's project undeniably generated social value for its participants. It provided young artists with a platform to hone their artistic skills, network with their peers, and showcase their work to the public. Moreover, it fostered a sense of community and provided exposure to a broader range of art forms, enhancing their artistic versatility.

Regarding "Impact," the project demonstrated significant potential. By providing accessible art education, it encouraged young artists to actively shape their cultural environment, thereby having the potential for broad-reaching impact in their communities. This could lead to a deeper, more personal impact on individual participants and contribute to the vibrancy of the local art scene.

For "Sustainability," the project has potential for long-term social sustainability. The goal to build a community that operates independently of costly academic art education implies a structure that could sustain itself over time. As more artists join and contribute to the platform, it could maintain and even expand its activities.

Lastly, considering "Scalability," the project's structure could be replicated in other contexts or settings. By partnering with local art and cultural organizations, similar projects could be set up in other locations to support young artists. This adaptability to different environments, coupled with its independent structure, indicates good potential for scalability.

# Aleksandra Vagabonda: Jam Sessions for Everyone

The project under analysis is "Jam Sessions for Everyone," led by Aleksandra Vagabonda. She, as an art educator, leveraged her knowledge in music education and music therapy to organize regular meetings aimed at creating an inclusive community that encourages musical expression, intergenerational learning, and multicultural exchange. The project successfully created a safe space for people of diverse backgrounds, fostering social inclusion and shared musical experiences.

In terms of novelty and innovativeness, "Jam Sessions for Everyone" stands out due to its unique, community-focused approach to using music as a therapeutic and social tool. The open-ended structure of the sessions, allowing anyone to join at any time, introduces a flexible and adaptable model to community-based projects. This approach embraces the unpredictability of human connection, allowing for spontaneous interactions that fuel creativity and social cohesion. The blend of music, therapy, and community engagement, though not entirely new, is innovatively employed here to create a project that is both participatory and beneficial for individuals and the community.

The project creates value in several ways. Socially, it provides a space for people from different backgrounds to connect, share experiences, and develop a sense of belonging. It also offers emotional support and therapeutic benefits, aiding individuals in stress management, self-confidence, and emotional expression. Furthermore, it provides an opportunity for participants to gain new experiences and learn about different instruments and musical traditions, contributing to personal growth and development.

The impact of the project is evident in the changed moods of participants and the increased self-esteem reported by Vagabonda. The project successfully created a community of about 40 people, which is a significant impact considering the personal and intimate nature of the project.

As for sustainability, the project's flexible and adaptive structure enhances its potential to sustain over the long term. The initiative does not rely heavily on resources, with most of the instruments provided by the participants themselves or by the organizer, which also supports financial sustainability.

Finally, the project exhibits potential for scalability. The concept of using music as a tool for social inclusion and community building can be replicated in different contexts, considering local musical traditions and community structures. This flexibility can be beneficial in introducing the project to new communities, contributing to its scalability and potential to have a broader impact.

# Nastya Kuranda: Yoga-Sessions for Ukrainian Refugees

The project being analyzed is "Yoga-Sessions for Ukrainian refugees" by Nastya Kuranda. This initiative was designed as a refuge and therapeutic tool for refugees, predominantly women, who have sought shelter in Dresden, Germany. Given the therapeutic nature of yoga, it aimed to provide a safe haven for these individuals to find peace, practice personal care, and to create an opportunity for bonding.

Analyzing the innovativeness of the project, it is clear that Nastya brought a unique solution to a problem faced by her community. The use of yoga as a tool for mental and physical wellness in a refugee community is a novel approach. It allowed participants to relax, release stress, and also fostered social cohesion amongst refugees. Yoga is a relatively low-cost activity, requiring only a suitable space and yoga mats, so it presents a creative and cost-effective solution to address emotional and psychological stress.

In terms of value creation, this project has delivered significant benefits. Participants were given the opportunity to experience peace and personal care, which has a profound impact on mental health, especially in the context of displacement and trauma that refugees often face. Moreover, Nastya's project helped build bridges between individuals, fostering a sense of belonging and community that is crucial for their integration into a new society.

When considering impact, it is evident that the project has the potential for substantial influence. While the number of direct participants may be relatively small (around 20 individuals), the overall effects extend far beyond. The sense of community, well-being, and social inclusion that the project promotes have broader implications for the participants' integration within the Dresden community.

The project is also sustainable, with a minimal environmental footprint. It also has potential in terms of social sustainability, as it fosters well-being, inclusion, and a sense of community among a marginalized group. Financial sustainability may depend on securing spaces for yoga sessions and basic yoga equipment, but these costs are relatively low and could be covered through fundraising or donations.

In terms of scalability, the project can be replicated in other contexts or settings, serving other communities, not just refugees. The simplicity of the project, its low cost, and the universal appeal and benefits of yoga practice mean it could be adapted to serve various other communities facing stress, trauma, or social isolation. Thus, Nastya Kuranda's "Yoga-Sessions for Ukrainian refugees" project exemplifies the power of innovative, community-centered projects that provide value and positively impact their beneficiaries.

In the context of addressing social inclusion, mental health, and cultural preservation, her approach of using music as a unifying and therapeutic tool stands out. It exhibits creativity, adaptability, and a novel way to solve problems experienced by refugees and locals in Dresden alike.

The project creates significant value for its beneficiaries. By promoting social inclusion and fostering intercultural dialogue, it supports the Ukrainian community in Dresden to cope with trauma and feel more included. For the non-Ukrainians, it presents an opportunity to engage with and appreciate the rich Ukrainian culture, hence fostering better integration and understanding among diverse communities.

In terms of impact, the project's potential is multi-faceted. While the number of participants in a single event might be relatively small, the project's effects resonate on a wider scale. It not only offers a means of self-expression and healing for the participants but also acts as a bridge to foster intercultural understanding, which could significantly impact social cohesion in the long run.

Sustainability-wise, the project's design and implementation make it potentially sustainable in the long term. It has low environmental impact, and the costs associated with running such a project are relatively low. Socially, it promotes integration and mental wellbeing, which contributes to the long-term health of the community.

The scalability of the project is also considerable. Izabela's approach can easily be replicated in other settings and for other communities, not just for Ukrainians. The universal language of music and its therapeutic benefits could serve various communities experiencing distress, trauma, or social exclusion, making the "Ukrainian Voice Jam" project a robust model of using arts for community building and social inclusion.

It offers a unique approach to problem-solving by using art to address social inclusion, cultural understanding, and psychological wellbeing. By teaching the traditional

Ukrainian art of Petrykivka painting, Anna introduced a new cultural perspective and process to the community in Dresden.

#### Value Creation:

The project creates significant social value for its beneficiaries. For the Ukrainian participants, it empowered them by acknowledging and celebrating their culture and provided a therapeutic outlet for expressing their feelings. For non-Ukrainians, it offered a unique opportunity to understand Ukrainian traditions and get to know the Ukrainian community in a non-formal setting, promoting cultural understanding and social cohesion.

#### Impact:

The workshop positively impacted its participants by fostering cultural exchange, creating a sense of community, and providing therapeutic value. While its immediate impact was local, the propagation of this project through social media extends its scope, creating potential for a wider cultural and social impact.

The sustainability of the Petrykivka Workshop is apparent in the successful execution of the first in a series of workshops, indicating Anna's intention and capacity to continue these events. The ongoing need for cultural understanding, community building, and therapeutic outlets for displaced individuals supports the project's long-term social sustainability. Furthermore, Anna's acquisition of knowledge about fundraising in Germany increases the potential for the project's financial sustainability.

#### Scalability:

The project's concept is highly scalable and replicable in different contexts. The integration of different cultures and fostering of community through art and traditional cultural activities can be replicated in other locations with diverse or displaced communities. The project's successful execution and positive reception support the possibility for future similar initiatives, expanding its scale and increasing its potential impact.

# Simone Pacini's Building the Landscape-Teen: Networking Event

Novelty and Innovativeness: Ermes Angelozzi's play utilizes storytelling, a universal medium, to shed light on a critical global issue. By personalizing the stories of the Aida Refugee Camp residents, Angelozzi brings a unique human touch to the narratives. Moreover, the project showcases Angelozzi's ability to adapt to circumstances, notably through the presentation of a theatrical performance that unveils underrepresented realities.

Sustainability: The sustainability of this project is visible in the ongoing involvement and interest of the community. As she gained experience in project management, networking, and organizational skills, the future implementation of similar initiatives seems promising.

Scalability: Rychagivska's project has potential for scalability, especially within other immigrant communities residing in culturally rich cities. The concept could be replicated to foster community connection and cultural appreciation elsewhere. Given its success within the Ukrainian community in Athens, it stands to reason that similar initiatives could be equally successful among other communities. The key would lie in adapting the project to suit the needs and interests of the target community.

#### Vicinity Project Analysis: Oleksandra Novikova

Oleksandra, empathizing with their situation as a Ukrainian migrant herself, sought to introduce them to the splendors of their new host city, Athens, through a day of exploration and film photography.

Novelty and Innovativeness: Oleksandra's approach is innovative as it leverages the arts, specifically film photography, as a medium for fostering connections, sharing experiences, and bridging cultural gaps. The project was rooted in the current societal issue of migration due to conflict, and it introduced an empathetic, personalized approach to assisting newcomers in adapting to a new environment.

Value Creation: "Vicinity" creates significant value for its beneficiaries, the young Ukrainian teenagers. The project offered them an intimate tour of Athens, allowing them to forge new memories, gain familiarity with their surroundings, and develop a sense of belonging in a new land. It also served as an expressive outlet, enabling them to capture their experiences and emotions through film photography.

Impact: The impact of the project is profound on a personal level. Although the scale is not wide, the depth of impact on the teenagers is significant. Furthermore, the project impacts a broader audience by raising awareness about the experiences of displaced individuals, fostering empathy and understanding within the community.

Sustainability: Sustainability is a more challenging aspect for this project. While the emotional support and familiarization with the new city are valuable, these benefits are mostly short-term. For long-term sustainability, the project would need to be expanded to involve more individuals, perhaps creating a program where migrants regularly meet, share experiences, and explore the city together.

Scalability: "Vicinity" holds potential for scalability. The concept could be replicated in other cities, aiding migrants worldwide. It could also be expanded to include more participants and different activities. For instance, introducing group projects where migrants can

collectively work on art projects could promote social interaction and inclusion. However, for successful scalability, additional resources and partnerships may be necessary.

In conclusion, "Vicinity" exhibits a novel and empathetic approach to addressing the challenges faced by young migrants. It successfully utilizes arts as a medium for social inclusion and emotional expression. Though the project has areas to improve in terms of sustainability and scalability, its foundational premise holds promise for future growth and replication.

This creative approach is a unique way of enabling a detained person to reconnect with the world outside, providing an avenue for emotional support. It's an artistic intervention and an act of solidarity which introduces a unique narrative and perspective.

Value Creation: The project offers immense social value by bringing attention to the refugees' experiences, fostering empathy and understanding within the community. The series of photographs taken at Edgar's favorite spots, coupled with a narrative of his experiences, provide an emotive, humanistic portrayal of refugees' realities. It leverages art as a tool for social commentary, fostering a more empathetic and inclusive society.

Impact: The potential impact of the Extended Eyes project is profound, particularly when viewed from the standpoint of a detained individual like Edgar. The project brings to light the personal stories of refugees, an often marginalized and misunderstood group. #### Rahima Haidari's Afghan Weaving Workshop

Rahima Haidari, a native Afghan, offered an intimate look into the Hazari culture with her workshop on traditional Afghan weaving. Rahima, who relocated to Slovenia due to her marriage, utilized this platform to share her cultural heritage and knowledge despite her limited language skills in both English and Slovene. Over 25 women joined the workshop, held at the Slovenian Ethnographic Museum (SEM), not only learning the craft but also experiencing a therapeutic gathering that fostered a sense of community.

Analyzing the project through the lens of innovativeness, the workshop shines by introducing a novel experience into the Slovenian community. Rahima's initiative of sharing Hazari weaving techniques provides a unique solution to the challenge of cultural understanding, particularly for the Hazari ethnic group, and helps her to adapt to her new home. The workshop's design also shows creativity, especially in the combination of crafting and therapeutic gathering, which can boost social inclusion and cohesion.

From the perspective of value creation, the workshop creates substantial social benefits. It builds bridges between different cultures and strengthens social ties among the participants, ultimately fostering a sense of community. Moreover, Rahima herself benefits from the workshop. She not only gains new skills in conducting and organizing such an event but also improves her language proficiency and confidence, which could potentially open new career opportunities for her.

Regarding the project's impact, it is quite significant on both a micro and macro level. On the one hand, it gives a voice to the Hazari culture and helps preserve its traditional weaving techniques, contributing to cultural diversity and preservation. On the other hand, the therapeutic aspect of the workshop positively impacts the participants, helping to alleviate feelings of isolation and loneliness.

Sustainability is another crucial aspect of the project. Financial sustainability might seem challenging initially, considering Rahima's unemployment. Social sustainability is evident through the strengthening of social ties and community building, while the environmental impact seems neutral.

Lastly, scalability is a considerable potential aspect of the project. The model of combining a traditional crafting workshop with a therapeutic and community-building approach can be replicated in other cultural contexts. This means the project has the potential to serve as a blueprint for future initiatives, further enhancing its value and impact.

In summary, Rahima Haidari's Afghan Weaving Workshop is a socially valuable and innovative project that contributes to cultural preservation and community building, holds promising sustainability potential, and can serve as an inspiring model for similar future projects.

Analyzing the project's innovativeness, it stands out for addressing the underrepresentation of dark-skinned individuals in stories, offering a unique solution to the challenges faced by these young girls. The use of storytelling as an empowerment tool, along with collaborative drawing, showcases creativity in engaging the participants and fostering self-esteem and confidence.

In terms of value creation, the project has significant social benefits. It provides a safe and empowering space for young girls to express themselves and explore their identity, promoting social inclusion and cohesion. By recognizing and validating the experiences of these girls, the workshop creates social value and a sense of belonging. The project also equips the participants with new knowledge and skills, fostering their personal growth and creative development.

As for impact, the "Heroines" workshops have a profound effect on both the participants and Jasna herself. The young girls gain a platform to be heard and recognized, learn from inspiring stories, and support each other. The therapeutic effect of creative expression helps them overcome feelings of difference and discrimination. For Jasna, leading the literary workshops enhances her leadership skills and confidence, contributing to her personal and professional growth.

Regarding sustainability, the long-term benefit for Jasna lies in the skills and experience gained through this project, which can support her future career pursuits. The workshop's impact on social cohesion and inclusion has lasting effects on vulnerable communities, like Jasna's family. However, financial sustainability might be a challenge, considering her unemployment status.

### War in Ukraine and Youth - how do young people perceive the War in Ukraine? by Tetyana Donets-Savko






